Birth

Spoons are one of the oldest eating utensils on the planet. As long as humans needed food, they needed something to scoop it up with. Knives and forks are mostly needed in fashion. Seashells or shaped stones were natural spoons. Earlier these did not have handles & that's when a Spoon was born.

History

There is no definitive time period for the invention of the Spoon. The archaeological evidence shows that Spoons with handles were used for ancient Egyptian religious purposes from 1000 BC. The most common material at that was wood due to its low cost. During the Greek & Roman empires, Spoons were made of Bronze and Silver. Documented evidence of Spoon in England was in 1259- an itinerary item of King Edward

Evolution

A spoon is a utensil having a shallow bowl (head), oval or round with a handle at the end. It is called cutlery or flatware in the US. Spoons earlier were used for serving but also used in food preparation, mixing, stirring, and tossing ingredients. Presently, Spoons are made from metal viz. silver, silverware, plated or solid, wood, porcelain or plastic. Earlier they were also made from ivory, flint, slate, and bones (in China).



Types and uses.

Primarily used for eating liquid or semi-liquid foods viz. soup, stew, or ice cream. For small or powdery solid items viz. rice, sugar, cereals, peas etc. In Southeast Asia, they are used for eating and forks are used to push food onto a spoon. The widest use of a Spoon is for cooking and serving. Also, for stirring, mixing, blending, dissolving, cooling & preventing stickiness.


